

# President Trevor Bagust

After his veterinary degree, Trevor completed his PhD in animal virology at the University of Queensland in 1970. His research projects in-

cluded avian leukosis and reticuloendotheliosis, avian immunosuppressive viruses and infectious laryngotracheitis virus. He has authored more than 150 scientific publications.

He was Director of the Australia-China Poultry Projects (1988-1996), whose technology transfer (SPF and poultry diseases diagnosis), facilities design, and training of key Chinese laboratory personnel laid significant foundations for the subsequent development of China's modern intensive poultry industry.

In 1996 Trevor became a Senior Lecturer at the University of Melbourne, where he developed a Master of Veterinary Studies course for postgraduate veterinary specialisation in Avian Health-in-Production. He has been a central figure in establishing Avian Health Online. This program enables postgraduate education and competencies training of avian veterinarians by interactive distance education.

## VICE PRESIDENT Hafez M. Hafez

After gaining his veterinary and masters degree from Cairo University in 1975, Mohamed Hafez completed his Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine at

the department of Poultry Diseases, Giessen University, Germany, in 1981. In 1994 he finished the Habilitation thesis at Munich University.

In 1997 he became the head of the Institute of Poultry Diseases at Free University, Berlin. He is an honorary Professor at the University of Hohenheim, Germany and at the University of Alexandria, Egypt. Prof. Hafez's career has focused on poultry diseases in general and respiratory and foodborne diseases, management and hygiene in particular.

He is a veterinary poultry specialist; veterinary microbiology specialist and veterinary animal hygiene specialist. Since 2008 he has been a Diplomate of European College of Poultry Veterinary Science and he is currently the president of the college. From 2007 until August 2011 he was the president of the WVPA and is currently the vice-president of the Association. He is a member of several national and international scientific committees related to veterinary medicine.



## **EDITOR AVIAN PATHOLOGY Janet Bradbury**

Janet Bradbury is Emeritus Professor at the University of Liverpool Veterinary School in the UK. She is also Editor-in-Chief of the Avian Pathology

journal. Her main interests include mycoplasmas in birds, especially diagnosis; and she is currently running a diagnostic service.

Janet is a member and former Chair of the International Committee on Systematics and Taxonomy of the Mollicutes. She is also a member and former Chair of the International Research Programme on Comparative Mycoplasmology Avian Team. Janet is an honorary Life member of the World Veterinary Poultry Association, the British Veterinary Poultry Association and the International Organization for Mycoplasmology.

Janet has also become a beekeeper and now has two hives!

## VICE PRESIDENT Nigel Horrox

Nigel graduated from the University of Edinburgh in Scotland in 1976 and since then has worked with poultry – firstly in a general veterinary practice

and since 1980 on his own. Initially, he worked mainly with turkeys but then got more involved with chickens, having several of the UK's then major producers among his clients.

Since 1990, he has focused more on international work, mainly in Africa and Asia, and for many years was veterinary consultant to one of the world's largest duck companies with involvement from breeding through to the cooking plants. This work also involved a lot of technical training and over a 25 year spell he has trained more than 3,000 poultry personnel on management courses in South Africa.

### **Austrian branch news**

This year the annual meeting of the Austrian Branch took place at the University of Veterinary Medicine in Vienna (Vetmeduni Vienna), with the advantage of easy access to excellent lecture hall facilities.

The meeting took place on the 19th of May and was attended by members active in different areas of the poultry industry and academic institutions. The focus of the meeting covered various topics related to infectious diseases in poultry. The intention to also include practitioners as speakers talking about their own experience was once again kept and F. Sommer took up the duty this time with two presentations.

In one talk he concentrated on increased chick mortality in a broiler hatchery, reporting his experience during a residency he made some years ago in California.

In the second talk he described the progression of botulism in layers.

J. Lembeck from Pfizer Animal Health introduced a new IB vaccine based on the QX virus. This infection appeared first in 2006 in

layers in Austria but the problem has now shifted to broilers.

C. Hess presented a case report about the appearance of a poxvirus infection in turkeys which could be traced back to a nearby layer farm, indicating possible consequences of low biosecurity.


H. Schliessnig from the Austrian Health Service presented the latest information about salmonella legislation.



# AAAP and PSA meet jointly in St. Louis

The American Association of Avian Pathologists and the Poultry Science Association combined their annual meetings for the first time this year at the AVMA Convention. The combined meeting offered unique educational opportunities for members of both organisations and the convenience of attending two meetings at once for those who are members of both organisations.

The Scientific Program was held at the Americas Center Convention Complex in downtown St. Louis, just blocks away from the famous Gateway Arch. Many other meetings and events were held at the Hyatt Regency St. Louis at the Arch Hotel and the Renaissance Grand Hotel.

The Annual Meeting was ½ day longer this year than in years past, beginning at 7:30am on Saturday, July 16th and ending at 5:00pm on Tuesday, July 19th. A joint AAAP/PSA symposium titled, 'A Crystal Ball Look into the Future of....' was presented on Saturday, July 16th at 7:30am. Some 674 titles were presented in the Scientific Program by the PSA and AAAP. There were 400 oral presentations and 274 posters. Of those, AAAP had 133 oral presentations and 49 posters.

This year the Lasher-Eckroade History/WPSA Lecture was given by Greg Mathis. It was titled, 'The History of the Poultry Industry: Scientific Breakthroughs'.

Reed Rumsey Award winners Kabel Robbins and Ha-jung Roh presented their papers, 'Genotypic and phenotypic comparison of field isolates Enterococcus cecorum in outbreaks of spondylitis' and 'Interactions between multivalent attenuated live infectious bronchitis virus (IBV) vaccines in one-day-old chickens' respectively.

The Richard B. Rimler award winner this year was Sachin Kumar. He presented his paper, 'Reverse genetic studies of avian paramyxovirus type-3'. The Schwartz Travel Scholarship winner, Daniel Wilson, presented a poster titled, 'Occurrence of the cutaneous trematode Collyriclum faba in an American robin (Turdus migratorius) located in the Midwestern United States' and Bret Rings received the Outstanding Field Case/Diagnostic Report Award for his presentation of, 'The toxicity effects of feeding 1-alpha hydroxyl D3 to broiler breeding hens'.

Many joint social events were held by the two organisations. There was an opening ses-

sion and reception held on Saturday, July 16th, an ice cream social on Sunday, July 17th and a wine and cheese reception in the poster room at the convention center on Monday, July 18th. AAAP held its annual Awards Luncheon on Sunday, July 17th and the annual Business Meeting Monday, July 18th.

AAAP approved a new mission statement to

better reflect who we are and what we do as an association. The new mission statement reads: The American Association of Avian Pathologists promotes scientific knowledge to enhance the health, well being, and productivity of poultry to provide safe and abundant food for the world.

AAAP released a new publication entitled, A Practical Guide for

Managing Risk in Poultry Production edited by Robert L. Owen with 26 contributing authors. The book, available in print, is 275 pages and is also available as an ebook (without chapter 7 on ventilation) by visiting: http://www.aaap.info/biosecurity

### **Outcomes from Cancun**

At the General Business meeting it was reported that new branches had been formed in Jordan and Thailand and that membership at the end of 2010 was 2,199 in some 56 countries, with just over half of this in Europe.

Financially WVPA had returned a small profit in each of the last two years. WVPA had financially supported 11 young scientists (from Bangladesh, Egypt, India, Jordan, Pakistan, Poland, South Africa and Venezuela) so that they could attend the Cancun Congress.

Dr Marco Rebollo from Mexico reported an attendance of 893 people from 61 countries at the Mexican Congress and that 285 papers and posters were presented.

The success of Aerosols over the last two years was noted and it was pleasing to note that Avian pathology, which is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, is maintaining its very high ranking among veterinary science journals.

Dr Trevor Bagust from Australia became WVPA's present and his predecessor, Hafez Hafez from Germany, and Nigel Horrox, from the UK, became vice presidents with Francois-Xavier Le Gros from France being elected in as the new secretary/treasurer.

This meeting saw Erhard Kaleta (vice president) and Ursula Heffels-Redmann retiring from the Executive. Both have given many years of excellent service to WVPA and were elected Honorary Life Members.

Profs Bruce Calnek and László Stipkovits were unanimously elected as Honorary Life Members in recognition of their long and valued service to poultry veterinary science and WVPA over many years.

# WVPA Young Poultry Veterinarian of the Year

The World Veterinary Poultry Association (WVPA) has teamed up with Pfizer Animal Health Global Poultry to launch a new, global award for poultry veterinarians.

The WVPA Young Veterinarian of the Year 2012 award will be presented at Poultry Focus Asia in Bangkok, February 2012 and the 2013 award will be presented at the WVPA Congress in France the following year.

The winner will receive US\$ 5,000 towards travel and accommodation expenses for attending an international scientific/technical or continued professional education meeting of their choice.

The award is open to qualified veterinarians who are under the age of 35 on 31st December 2011 and will be judged by a panel of global experts. Dr Trevor Bagust, President of the WVPA, believes that the award will help to highlight the high standard of veterinary care that the poultry industry has access to.

"Maintaining excellent bird health and welfare is at the very heart of efficient poultry production and so veterinarians have a key role to play in successful poultry businesses.

"This new award will look for individuals who have the dedication, motivation and flexibility that modern poultry veterinarians must have in order to add value to the businesses they service.

"We are looking for individuals who go be-

yond best practice; individuals who are an integral and invaluable part of the businesses they support."



# Feeding mycotoxins — treatment is uncertain

The question of possible interactions between mycotoxins and infectious disease agents has been important to animal husbandry and health ever since one of the first reports of aflatoxicosis (Siller and Ostler, 1961) described the isolation of salmonella from the internal organs of turkeys during field outbreaks of the disease.

Mycotoxins can be the primary agent causing acute health or production problems in poultry, but more likely, mycotoxins are a factor contributing to a higher incidence of disease, poor reproductive performance or suboptimal egg and meat production.

Recognition of the impact of mycotoxins on animal production has been limited by the difficulty of diagnosis. Symptoms are often non-specific and the result of a progression of effects, making a diagnosis difficult or impossible because of the complex clinical results with a wide diversity of symptoms.

The difficulty of diagnosis is increased due to limited research, occurrence of multiple mycotoxins, non-uniform distribution, interactions with other factors, carryover of mycotoxins into the eggs and problems of sampling and analysis. Symptoms of mycotoxicosis in poultry vary depending on the mycotoxins involved and their interactions with other stress factors as, for example, sub optimum farm management, poor feed quality and presence of infections at the farm.

The more stressed birds are most affected, perhaps because their immune systems are already suppressed. Poultry does not respond well to veterinary therapy, antibiotics have to be overdosed and used for a longer time, antiparasitics are not 100% effective.

As an example we can present the experiment on 184 one day old broiler chicks. These were divided into two groups and the effects of ochratoxin A on Escherichia coli challenged broiler chicks were evaluated (Kumar et al. 2003).

After 14 days receiving a diet containing 2mg/kg ochratoxin A, each group was further separated

into two groups: one was inoculated with E. coli O78, whereas the other group was not inoculated with E. coli. Mortality was 14.3% in chicks infected with E. coli but fed no ochratoxin A. Mortality increased to 35.7% in chicks fed ochratoxin A and infected with E. coli. In addition, the effects on decreased body weight were more pronounced in chicks fed ochratoxin A and infected with E. coli.

In another experiment by Boonchuvit et al. (1975) with a total of 400 birds, one half was fed a toxin-free diet and the other half received the same diet but with 16µg/g of T-2 toxin. At one week of age, one group of 10 birds fed each diet was inoculated orally with salmonella. A combination of S. typhimurium and T-2 toxin resulted in 17.5% mortality, while mortality in the group of birds fed a mycotoxin free diet but contaminated with salmonella was 0%.

The effect on environmental conditions on final effect of aflatoxins was investigated in experiments by Manning and Watt (1990).

Chicks acclimated to 10-12°C were more resistant to aflatoxins (8mg/kg) after 10 and 20 days than chicks acclimated to 28-30°C as the mortality in this group was much higher (90%) in comparison to the mortality in those broiler exposed to lower environmental temperature (20%).

A lot of investigations are performed in the field of nutrition, genetics and/or animal welfare to increase farm profitability. Nevertheless, birds frequently do not perform according to their capability due to mycotoxins and much of their economic loss stays unaccounted for. Often veterinarians might cure only secondary symptoms in the animals and not the main issue. Taking all this into account, great awareness must be given to the interaction of mycotoxins with other main factors.

A correct mycotoxin risk management is a key factor for reaching optimum performance in animal husbandry.






### From around the world
